Jo Ann Niccum-Johnson of Kirkwood, MO passed away January 16, 2016. A graduate of Northwestern University, she was a part of the physical therapy profession and APTA for over 55 years.



In clinical practice, Jo Ann was an able home health therapist and administrator. She was there when Missouri became one chapter in the APTA and physical therapists were licensed in that state. In addition to being our president, JoAnn was a founding member of the Prime Timers Group in Missouri and a very active member of the Home Health Group. Over the years, she served on multiple committees and in leadership positions. Other than her Prime Timers leadership, many colleagues remember her for her photographic abilities and many years of editorship for the Missouri Physical Therapy Association Newsletter.





In Memoriam - Dr. Mildred L. Wood

Mildred L. (Woody) Wood, PhD, SHRS associate professor emerita, passed away Sunday, February 28, 2016 at the age of 95. Recruited by friend and fellow-physical therapist Dean Anne Pascasio, Dr. Wood came to what was then the School of Health Related Professions in 1974 and held a primary appointment in the school's Division of Health Related Professions (SHRP) Interdisciplinary Programs where she taught Anatomy. She also carried a secondary appointment in Anatomy in the School of Medicine.

Dr. Wood received her undergraduate degree in health and physical education from East Stroudsburg University (1942), a certificate in physical therapy from the Ashford Army General Hospital as part of the War Department Emergency Certificate Course in 1945, a master of arts in anatomy from Duke University (1957), and a doctor of philosophy degree in anatomy from the University of Kentucky (1973).

She served in the Army from 1945 to 1954 with a final rank of Captain. She transferred to active Army Reserve with assignments to various Army Reserve medical units and retired with the permanent rank of Colonel USAR with responsibilities to the Assistant Chief of the Army Medical Specialist Corps (Physical Therapist Section) of the Office of the Surgeon General of the US Army. One of her many military education courses was a US Army Command and General Staff Officer course at the Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth. As part of her unofficial role in SHRP, Dr. Wood counseled and assisted many SHRP students who expressed interest in entering military service.

In her career, Dr. Wood was on the faculty at the University of Pennsylvania, Duke University, the University of Kentucky as a graduate assistant in anatomy, and at the Albany Medical College of Union University prior to joining the University of Pittsburgh faculty. Her remaining active career as an academician from 1974 until retirement was at the University of Pittsburgh.

Within the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA), which she joined in 1946, Dr. Wood was a founding member of the Research Section. She had a complete collection of every Research Section journal that she donated to Pitt that have since been scanned and saved for future generations. Dr. Wood was a former President and Chief Delegate of the North Carolina chapter of the APTA and an elected member of the national APTA nominating committee. She served as a member of the APTA Judicial Committee and as Secretary/Treasurer of the Research Section. Woody was also an active member of the Prime Timers of the APTA both before and after her retirement.

Dr. Wood was known for being very precise and a stickler for detail. Her involvement in the American Physical Therapy Association (APTA) witnessed her helping many districts and chapters develop by-laws and regulations, something that gave her great pleasure. She was a recipient of the APTA's Lucy Blair Service Award and enjoyed attending APTA conferences where she reconnected with PT friends and colleagues from across the country.

According to Dr. Pascasio, Woody, as a young girl, played the violin and developed a keen interest in classical music. In later years, she was an avid attendee of symphony performances and purposely chose to sit in upper level seats so she could watch the string musicians play.

In 2005, Dr. Wood established the Mildred L. Wood SHRS Endowed Student Resource Fund which provides annual awards to deserving SHRS students. She will be missed by all who knew and loved her for her dedication, loyalty, perseverance, generosity and kind heart.

Unbeknownst to some of her students, Dr. Wood had a quick sense of humor. At her school-wide retirement party in 1985, she arrived in a flapper dress bedecked with beads to the attendees' delight.

In Memoriam - Dr. Marylou Barnes

Marylou Riddlberger Barnes died November 26, 2015 at Ashley Glen Center in Peachtree City, GA, of complications from strokes. She was born February 27, 1930 in Bridgewater, her beloved Shendoah Valley of Virginia. Marylou was graduated from Madison College in 1952 with a BS degree in Physical Education. She had been teaching high school in Petersburg, Virginia when, on a dare, she applied to and was subsequently accepted into the physical therapy program at the Medical College of Virginia (1957). The profession of physical therapy was to become her lifelong passion and, never entering into anything half way, she has put her own unique stamp on it. Marylou has served her profession at every level. After beginning as a staff therapist at Woodrow Wilson Rehabilitation Center in Virginia (1957-59) she went on to roles as supervisor and director of clinical education (1963-66) and as departmental chief at Rockingham Memorial Hospital, Harrisonburg, Virginia (1959-60).

In 1968, she returned to James Madison University and completed a Master's degree in Counseling. At this point, her career took another fateful turn. From a trashcan where she had thrown it, a friend retrieved a letter inviting her to apply for a position at West Virginia University to become the founder and chair of a proposed School of Physical Therapy. In 1975, she completed a Doctoral degree at WVU. While at WVU, Dr. Barnes was appointed Chair of the Athletic Council, and thought to be the first woman ever to chair an athletic council at a Division I University (1976-79). She was very active in the WV state chapter including stints as editor, secretary, and chief delegate. For her visionary efforts, the graduation lecture at WVU is given in her honor. In 1978, James Madison University bestowed on her the Annual Distinguished Alumni Achievement Award.

In 1979, she became Professor and Chair of Physical Therapy at Georgia State University in Atlanta. A consummate educator and administrator, Marylou has a very rare talent for leadership and management with an uncanny sense of foresight and vision for the future. She has been considered by her peers to be a "leader among leaders". She was often sought as a speaker, not only for her oratorical skills and well known sense of humor, but because she can convey a message of importance and substance. Her contributions through the written word are as legendary as are those of the spoken word. She has authored some of the first texts ever produced for the profession by physical therapists.

Dr Barnes value as has been recognized through her many awards. She has been honored with the highest award of the American Physical Therapy Association, the Mary McMillan Lecture Award (1992). She was the thirty-seventh therapist to be designated a Catherine Worthingham Fellow (1994). For her devoted and selfless work on state and national committees and offices, such as Annual Conference Chair and for developing the national continuing education program, she was awarded the Lucy Blair Service Award by the APTA (1988). Similarly she was given the Neurology Section Service Award (1995) having served as journal editor (1983-85) and president (1985-87). The Education Section of the APTA granted her the Leadership in Education Award (1995), and the University of Florida the Barbara White Award (1994). In 1993, the University of Indianapolis conferred upon her an honorary doctorate.

As a mentor and role model, Marylou gave unselfishly of herself to many individuals including students, clinicians, professors, researchers and administrators. Retired as a Professor Emerita in 1995, she enjoyed traveling and driving the golf car paths to visit her children and five grandchildren.
